THE SPARROW'S STRUGGLE

One thing we rarely talk about in our Newsletters is the children's struggles inside the children's home. Yes, we do our part in providing everything we can (by the grace of God), in every aspect of the child's life; food, shelter, clothing, education, spiritual guidance, and love. But nothing can replace their true families and their longing to belong to a family, or being part of their own family. Most of our children have families but they aren't in a position to support their needs. For Ben (not his real name) in the span of one month he has ran away twice and has misbehaved more times than we can count, all because he longs to be with his mother. Since Ben has been in our care his mother has had more children, has separated from his father and is unemployed. He insists he doesn't want our help, he doesn't want to go to school, and just wants us to leave him alone. He blames everyone and everything around him as his reason for leaving, but we can clearly see how he just wants to be free to do whatever he wants with his family. Since he was insisting, we have taken steps for his mother to regain custody of him but in 2 occasions she failed the "Parental Capability Assessment" of the social services. I have explained to Ben multiple times that it is in his best interest that he stays in the children's home. His mother has explained to him that she is struggling to provide for the children who are already in her care. But after a few weeks, we are back to the same problems. It must be really hard for him to see that his half brothers and sisters are with their mother while he isn't. This is the true emotional struggle of our sparrows, not only with Ben but with many of our kids when they reach adolescence and have more awareness of their situation and the situation of their families, it often becomes harder for them to accept that they are in a children's home. And it is especially harder as we approach Christmas, that is why we try to make Christmas extra special for them to take their minds off the reality of life and just enjoy. We can only do so much for them, but we can never replace their families. So we do value your prayers for our children and our staff who have to deal with the children as they hit out often by misbehaving and tantrums especially in the holiday season. Two of

our children have just learned that their mother (who is an ex-prisoner and extremely poor) now has Leukaemia. So their situations are so hard for them to come to terms with at such a young age. It is hard for them to be apart from their families, but we know that they will one day realise that being with us at POCCH was only for their good.

You may have remembered Daryl, who we rescued a few months ago. Since has been in our care, we have observed some areas of concern regarding his behaviour and development. He shows very obvious signs of ADHD, but to be professionally assessed of this is not easy here in the Philippines. Specialists are not easy to come by and are very expensive, but we have him placed on a waiting list for when a doctor is available. We have received many complaints from his teachers and houseparent who struggle keeping him focused, which may have been the mother's struggle when he was in her care. We would value your prayers for him, that we will be able to get him properly diagnosed and give him the best care suitable for him.

Though the financial situation of POCM has not been great these past few months, we do praise God because of his providence in different ways. We have received various donations from different companies and groups including Helping Hands Healing Hearts Ministries. We have received milk, diapers, canned goods, toiletries, rice and many essentials to make us through the month. We are especially blessed to have received a New Washing Machine for our boys unit, which was a desperate need. So we Praise God for all these blessings!

COUSIN MIKE

It is with great sadness that we announce the sad loss of my cousin Mike, who has been living in Manila for 7 years, (who is a retired project Manager and was helping us with our school renovation project), had been struggling with wounds on his feet due to diabetes for 2 years. He had a toe amputated at a hospital near us (as all patients here in the Philippines have to be accompanied by a family member or carer 24/7). The surgery was a success and Mike was convalescing in our home when Nathanael and I left for ministry in the U.S. Though he had agreed to stay at our home for a month, he got bored and went home early to Manila. Sadly soon after he left he had a fall and cracked his hip causing immense pain, and at the same time his stomach began to swell profusely. When we arrived back in the Philippines, Mike was already confined in hospital in Manila, with a diagnosis of cirrhosis of the liver. He spent £7K in two days in hospital in Manila and felt worse. It was then that I was able to pray with Mike as he returned to the Lord. We had to transferred him to hospital here in Olongapo where we would be able to provide the

required 24/7 care and a little more affordable. Sadly Mikes body was too weak to undergo any surgical intervention at this point, but doctors were still hopeful. His mother and sister were able to come to be with him and he told them (and others) that he had returned to Christ. Hours after his sister Lesley returned to the U.K. his only functioning kidney started to fail. Mike assured us that he was right before the Lord. It was a very hard time for us to see him suffer,

(especially for my aunt Hazel who had already lost her youngest son during Covid). Aunty Hazel and I were with him when he breathed his last. Now, praise God, he is free from suffering and is with the Lord.



Lesley returned to the Philippines and we are helping them with the legalities as they are in an unfamiliar country and culture while dealing with their grief. We would value your prayers.
